## Prescription Drug “Take Back”

The Police Department will be taking part in a nationwide prescription drug “Take Back” initiative that seeks to prevent increased pill abuse and theft. We will be collecting potentially dangerous expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs for destruction at PDQ, 400 Prospect Avenue, on Saturday, September 25, 2010, 10:00 am – 2:00 pm. The service is free and anonymous; no questions asked.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Many Americans are not aware that medicines that remain in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are increasing at alarming rates, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, many Americans do not know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them down the toilet or throwing them away – both potential safety and health hazards.

This collaborative nationwide effort, headed by the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), will help eliminate a major source of abused prescription drugs and reduce the dangers they pose to public safety and the environment.

## MOVE OVER LAW: WATCH OUT FOR EMERGENCY VEHICLES

Law enforcement officers are trained and equipped to safely handle an array of dangerous situations. However, when officers are standing or parked on the side of the highway for a traffic stop or to assist a motorist, they are virtually defenseless against the constant danger of being hit by vehicles traveling at high speeds just a few feet away.

To help protect law enforcement officers, emergency responders, road maintenance workers, and others who work on the side of roadways, Wisconsin has a Move Over Law. The law requires drivers to shift lanes or slow down in order to create a safety zone for a squad car, ambulance, fire truck, tow truck or highway maintenance vehicle that is stopped on the side of a road with its warning lights flashing.

Drivers have two options for creating a safety zone. "If the road has more than one directional lane, like the Interstate, and you can switch lanes safely, you must move over to vacate the lane closest to the law enforcement or other emergency vehicle," says Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent David Collins. "If the road has a single directional lane or you can't safely move over, you must reduce your speed."

Signs to remind motorists about the Move Over Law are posted on highways near main entry points to Wisconsin. They read: "STATE LAW. MOVE OVER OR SLOW DOWN FOR STOPPED EMERGENCY VEHICLES."

"Failure of motorists to move over or slow down is one of the major reasons that motor vehicle crashes kill more law enforcement officers on duty than any other cause," says Superintendent Collins, "Obeying the Move Over Law will help protect motorists as well as our officers from needless crashes."

On July 30, the victim reported to police that her ex-boyfriend was making numerous harassing phone calls and sending threatening text messages to her after he learned that she had started dating again. The 38 year-old suspect was referred to the District Attorney for Disorderly Conduct charges.

On August 3, officers were investigating a suspicious person in the parking lot of a North Pioneer Road business. After making contact with the man, he attempted to run from officers. The 19 year-old Town of Friendship man was arrested for Resisting an Officer and was also issued a citation for Underage Alcohol Consumption.

On August 4, a Minnesota Avenue resident reported to police that someone had stolen part of a coin collection from her residence. Following an investigation, police referred the woman's 14 year-old granddaughter, a 14 year-old Fond du Lac boy and a 13 year-old Brownsville boy to Juvenile Court Services for Theft and Receiving Stolen Property.

On August 6, police were summoned to a North Pioneer Road business after a woman called 911 to report that her sister was being held there by her boyfriend at gunpoint against her will. Responding officers observed the man and woman leaving the business in a car and stopped the vehicle. Investigation revealed that the man and woman made up the story to upset her sister. The 33 year-old Fond du Lac man and 19 year-old Waupun woman were arrested and referred to the DA for Disorderly Conduct charges.

On August 10, police were contacted by a woman on Mockingbird Lane in Gaslight Terrace who reported that her ex-boyfriend had been calling her and sending her messages in violation of a restraining order. The 43 year-old Fond du Lac man was arrested for six counts of Violating a Restraining Order.

On August 14, a Green County man reported that his 3 year-old son had a black eye when he picked him up for visitation. According to the father, the boy had given several conflicting stories when asked what happened. It was determined that the boyfriend of the child's mother had struck the boy in the eye causing the injury. The 23 year-old Fond du Lac man was referred to the District Attorney for Child Abuse charges.

On August 19, a woman reported to police that her son's bike had been intentionally damaged while it was parked at Bessie Allen Middle School. After investigating the incident, a 13 year-old North Fond du Lac boy was referred to Juvenile Court Services for Damage to Property charges.

On August 24, police executed a search warrant at a Saratoga Avenue home after investigating a report of sexual offenses and drug activity occurring at that home. During the search, officers seized several pounds of marijuana, other hallucinogenic drugs, a significant quantity of cash and photography, video recording and computer equipment. A 32 year-old North Fond du Lac man was arrested and referred to the District Attorney for 24 criminal counts including Sexual Assault, Drug Trafficking, and Weapons charges.

On August 26, a resident on Illinois Avenue reported to police that an X-box gaming system and a Wii gaming system had been stolen from the residence. The resident's 24 year-old son was referred to the District Attorney for Theft charges.

## A CLOSER LOOK AT OFFICER STEVE PETRIE

Officer Steven Petrie started his career as a police officer with the Village of North Fond du Lac Police Department in July of 2008. Steven attended Marian University and graduated with a Bachelors Degree in Criminal Justice in December of 2008. Prior to coming to North Fond du Lac, he did an internship with the City of Fond du Lac Police Department serving as a Community Service Officer from January of 2007 to July of 2008.

Steven is a member of the Police Department's Bike Patrol and is currently assigned to second shift patrol. Steven is the Neighborhood Policing South Team leader.

## POLICE RECEIVE GRANT TO FIGHT UNDERAGE DRINKING

The police department was awarded \$2,334 in Highway Safety Funds to enforce underage drinking laws that prohibit the sale, purchase and consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors. Funding is provided by the Wisconsin Department of Justice as part of the Comprehensive Alcohol Risk ReDuction Project.

In 2008, the North Fond du Lac Police Department joined ten other Fond du Lac City and County agencies in the Safe Schools / Healthy Students Initiative. One goal of this initiative is to decrease substance use and abuse among children and youth by addressing factors that increase risk and promoting factors that minimize risk.

Major vehicle crashes are the leading causes of death for young people 15 to 20 years old. In 2007, teen drivers accounted for 9% of all drivers in crashes who were listed as had been drinking and 11% of those suspected of using other drugs. Wisconsin remains high in self-reported underage alcohol consumption and binge drinking.

The Police Department uses this grant to fund "alcohol saturation patrols" throughout the summer and especially during the national "Over the Limit; Under Arrest" alcohol crackdown" August 20 – September 6, 2010. Grant dollars are also used to conduct compliance checks throughout our community to encourage responsible alcohol sales. Compliance checks are an important part of reducing youth access to alcohol, and our task force partners throughout the County also conduct similar compliance checks.

Our goal is to make minors and their parents more aware of underage drinking laws and the dangerous consequences of underage drinking. This money will allow various community stakeholders to work together to identify needs and sustain a successful strategy to combat underage drinking. The CARD/ Compliance Check Program has proven very successful in Wisconsin. Studies have clearly demonstrated a relationship between age, risk factors and crash involvement.



## TRICK OR TREAT SAFETY TIPS

Halloween and trick-or-treat should be a time of fun and enjoyment. The Police Department urges everyone to follow these simple tips and guidelines so parents and youngsters can avoid unpleasant and dangerous surprises.

- Young children should always be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- Children should stop only at houses where the porch light is lit and they should **NEVER** enter a stranger's home or car to receive a treat.
- Children should stay on sidewalks and they should walk, not run.
- Costumes should be short enough so they do not present a tripping hazard, and masks, which can obstruct vision, should be removed before crossing streets or driveways.
- Parents should discuss with children the importance of trick-or-treating only in familiar neighborhoods and along an established route.
- Parents should establish a return time for older children.
- Children should stay away from and should not pet animals unfamiliar to them.
- Children should not eat anything before returning home, and parents should closely examine all treats and throw away any spoiled, unwrapped, or suspicious items.
- Homeowners should eliminate tripping hazards on porches and walkways, and jack o'lanterns with candles should be placed well away from where trick-or-treaters will be walking or standing.

Motorists should **slow down** and watch for children darting out from between parked cars and walking on roadways and curbs. Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.

## OCTOBER IS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

National Domestic Violence Awareness Month is observed every October across the country. National, state, and community organizations for violence prevention and victim services, businesses, health care providers, and others mark the month with educational programs, recognition and memorial ceremonies, community outreach, and other efforts.

Any violence taking place within a family or intimate relationship is domestic violence. It includes abuse of spouses, girlfriends and boyfriends, children, and elderly people. Domestic violence cuts across all socioeconomic, ethnic, racial, religious, and age groups.

- Every 7.2 seconds, a woman is beaten in the United States. Between three to four million women are battered each year.
- Everyday, 11 women are killed as the result of domestic abuse.
- Between 30 to 50% of all American families experience domestic abuse of some type within their lifetime.
- About 30% of all hospital emergency room visits by women and 70% of all assaults are attributed to domestic abuse.
- Over 3 million children witness domestic abuse each year in the United States.

Studies show that children who witness violence at home experience behavioral problems and increased aggression, have less developed social and conflict resolution skills, and may suffer long-term developmental effects. These youth are also at risk of engaging in future violence and of being abused themselves. Researchers have found that people who batter their partners are also more likely to abuse their children.

## SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

Motorists in North Fond du Lac will notice a very visible reminder to slow down in school crossings. The bright green and reflective signs remind motorists to yield to pedestrians. They serve as a reminder to drivers of the high likelihood of the presence of children and the need to slow down. The safety of our children is obviously important to the police department, the school district and residents, as well. Parents are encouraged to instruct their children to cross at these high visibility areas.

A number of incidents have been reported to police involving motorists failing to yield to pedestrians at several of these crossings, especially the crossing on Prospect Avenue near the high school practice athletic field. With the higher speed limit on Prospect Avenue it is very important that motorists slow down and wait for children crossing the street.

In addition to the traffic delineators, officers will be placing a strong emphasis on monitoring traffic in these areas during school hours and will be strictly enforcing traffic safety regulations. State law requires motorists to yield to a pedestrian once s/he has entered the street at a marked crosswalk. Fines for failure to yield to a pedestrian start at \$83.80.

Parents are encouraged to instruct their children to cross at these high visibility areas.
