Holiday Safety Tips

For most of us the holidays mean spending time with family and friends, decorating our homes and shopping for gifts. Unfortunately, for criminals the holidays are a time of added opportunities to steal and otherwise victimize others. The season also brings with it the increased risk of accidents. Here are some tips to make sure the holidays are safe and enjoyable.

- Always lock doors and windows when leaving the house, even for a few minutes.
- When leaving for an extended time, have friends or family watch the house and take in newspapers and mail.
- Use timers to turn on lights, a radio or television so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- Make sure that large displays of gifts are not visible through the windows and doors of your home.
- When out shopping, always keep your windows rolled up and the doors locked, whether driving or when parked.
- Never leave purses, wallets or cash in an unattended vehicle.
- Keep purchases in your trunk, never in view, so that your vehicle isn't a tempting target.
- Do not carry your social security card in your wallet or purse and remove any credit cards or checkbooks you won't be using.
- When shopping online, make sure to shop reputable online businesses and only on secure sites.
- Never use debit cards online; a thief could empty your checking account if the card number is stolen.
- Do not use public wi-fi spots to do your online shopping; these wireless networks are not secure.
- If hosting a holiday party, provide plenty of non-alcoholic drink alternatives and never force drinks on guests.
- Plan ahead! When attending a party, bring along a designated driver, make arrangements for a taxi or ask your host if you may stay overnight. As few as three drinks can double the chances of you being in an accident.

It is our hope that following these tips will help make your holiday season merry and safe!

Winter Parking Reminder

The Police Department would like to remind residents about the Winter Parking regulations. Winter Parking regulations for North Fond du Lac begin November 1st and remain in effect through March 31st. Please cooperate with public works crews by following the restrictions that have been established so that they can be most effective in keeping our roads safe.

The ordinance specifies that between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the snow removal season, it shall be illegal to park any vehicle on any street, highway, or any terrace, street, or highway right of way, during or after any snowfall where the accumulation of snow is one inch or more and the parking of a vehicle on the street, alley, highway, terrace, or right of way interferes with the timely and efficient removal of snow.

Parking penalties for the first violation of the winter parking ordinance during any snow removal season will be \$15.00 (\$30 if not paid within 5 days). The penalty for the second violation shall be \$30.00 (\$45 if not paid within 5 days). The third violation shall be \$50.00 (\$65 if not paid within 5 days), and the fine for any fourth or subsequent violation of the winter parking ordinance during a snow removal season shall be \$100.00.

During any time of snow emergency, which is determined by the Director of Public Works, all vehicles will be required to be moved off the streets by 2 a.m. Failure to adhere to this section will result in citation and towing of vehicles, which are in violation, at owner's expense.

TWO OFFICERS RECEIVE AWARDS

On December 20, 2010 Officers Matthew Birschbach and Jacob Eagan were awarded the North Fond du Lac Police Department Medal of Meritorious Service award. Additionally, State Representative John Townsend, together with Senator Randy Hopper, presented both officers with citations from the Wisconsin Legislature. These honors were bestowed upon the officers after they demonstrated remarkable commitment to the protection of life by willingly exposing themselves to significant risk during the early morning hours of November 28, 2010.

Officer Jacob R. Eagan began investigating the source of a bright flash of light in the night sky that resulted in a power outage in the Village of North Fond du Lac. Officer Eagan quickly came upon a car that had crashed into a power pole and was now on fire. Officer Eagan immediately notified the Communications Center and made contact with a person standing across the road from the crash scene.

Officer Matthew D. Birschbach arrived on the scene to assist Officer Eagan minutes later. Upon approaching the car, Officer Birschbach observed a man trapped inside the burning vehicle and shared his observations with Officer Eagan. Officer Eagan immediately notified the Communications Center of the trapped man.

In an effort to save the man's life, Officer Birschbach broke out several windows and attempted to pull the man from the burning car. Officer Eagan retrieved the fire extinguisher from his squad and immediately began attempting to knock down the flames that had now engulfed the front end of the vehicle. Because the man was pinned inside the heavily damaged car, Officer Eagan used several fire extinguishers and continued to make repeated attempts to suppress the flames while Officer Birschbach continued to attempt to free the man from the wreckage. Officers Birschbach and Eagan were ultimately unable to free the man from the car; however their combined efforts prevented him from dying in the car fire and greatly minimized burn injuries to the man. He was eventually extricated from the vehicle by fire department personnel and transported to the hospital by helicopter.

By repeatedly entering the burning car to remove the driver and to save the life of the trapped man, Officer Birschbach exposed himself to significant risk. Fortunately, he suffered only moderate smoke and chemical inhalation and lacerations. In his repeated efforts to suppress the fire and to save the life of the trapped man, Officer Eagan exposed himself to significant risk. Fortunately, he suffered only minor smoke inhalation and abrasions.

While law enforcement officers are indeed trained to refrain from nearing burning vehicles, an officer's commitment to the protection of his or her fellow man is oftentimes strong enough to cause him or her to expose oneself to greater risk of bodily harm or death than is necessary or even expected.

Please join us in thanking Officers Birschbach and Eagan for their unselfish dedication to the protection of life and in congratulating both officers on this achievement.

On October 9, a resident on Park Ridge Lane reported to police that the license plate was stolen from their car. No arrests have been made.

On October 12, a landlord reported to police that a window on a home in the 600 block of Indiana Avenue had been smashed. No arrests have been made.

On October 18, an employee at a Prospect Avenue business reported to police that a counterfeit \$100 bill had been passed at the business. The fake bill was sent to the United States Secret Service. No arrests have been made.

On October 30, a resident in the 400 block of Harrison Street reported to police that a window was broken when someone threw eggs at the front of the residence. No arrests have been made.

RESOLVED

On September 17, an officer investigating suspicious behavior at the Village Park discovered a subject with a marijuana pipe. The 16 year-old Fond du Lac boy was issued a citation for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

On September 24, a resident in the 400 block of Harrison Street reported that someone had stolen a bicycle from their garage. Two 17 year-old boys, one from North Fond du Lac and one from Lomira have been referred to the District Attorney on Burglary and Theft charges.

On September 28, a 16 year-old girl was referred to Juvenile Court Services for Battery after she physically assaulted another girl in the cafeteria at the High School.

On September 30, a resident on Broadway Street reported to police that someone had entered an unlocked vehicle and stole a Garmin GPS unit. Police recovered the GPS, and two Fond du Lac men, ages 20 and 21, were issued citations for Theft.

On October 4, family members reported to police that a man's live-in girlfriend had removed all of his property from the home following the man's death. After numerous unsuccessful attempts to informally resolve the matter, the 48 year-old woman was referred to the District Attorney for Theft charges.

On October 9, a resident on Mockingbird Lane called police and reported that her husband had come home drunk, and they began arguing. The woman told police that her husband began punching walls and threw water around the kitchen before leaving the residence. The 30 year-old man was referred to the District Attorney's office for Disorderly Conduct.

On October 22, police investigated a reported hit & run accident in the parking lot of a Wisconsin Avenue business. A 41 year-old Fond du Lac man was issued a citation for Owner's Liability for Hit & Run.

On October 22, a resident in the 400 block of Harrison Street called police and reported that her son was highly intoxicated and belligerent. She told police that he had damaged property inside her apartment and was knocking on the neighbors' doors seeking alcohol and medications. The 47 year-old North Fond du Lac man was arrested for Disorderly Conduct.

On October 23, an officer investigating two suspicious teens near the intersection of Prospect Avenue and Lakeshore Drive at 1:40 a.m., discovered two baggies of marijuana on one of the boys. The 17 year-old was issued a citation for Possession of Marijuana.

On October 24, officers responded to a report of a man and woman fighting at a residence in the 500 block of Maine Avenue. Investigating officers learned that the man had been violating his probation by drinking. He began physically fighting with officers as they attempted to take him into custody. The 24 year-old North Fond du Lac man was arrested for Disorderly Conduct and Resisting an Officer.

On October 30, officers responded to a call for assistance with a man reportedly out of control at a residence in the 600 block of Wisconsin Avenue. Investigating officers learned that the man had been fighting with his girlfriend and had locked her in a bedroom and held her against her will. The 20 year-old North Fond du Lac man was arrested for False Imprisonment, Battery, Disorderly Conduct and Intimidation of a Victim.

On November 3, police were contacted by a resident on Center Street who reported that a 14 year-old girl there had cut off a court ordered GPS monitoring bracelet and was a runaway. The girl was taken into custody and referred to Juvenile Court Services for Damage to Property after she returned home the next day.

On November 12, an officer investigating a suspicious vehicle at the Village Park found the suspect in possession of prescription medication. The 17 year-old North Fond du Lac boy was referred to the District Attorney's office for Possession of a Controlled Substance.

RESOLVED (CONTINUED)

On November 22, police were contacted by ASTOP Sexual Abuse center reporting that a 16 year-old girl had disclosed a sexual relationship with a 20 year-old North Fond du Lac man. During investigation, the man admitted the relationship with the underage girl. He was referred to the District Attorney's office for Sex with a Child 16 or Older.

On November 24, police received numerous reports of vehicles, buildings and traffic signs that had been vandalized with graffiti. During subsequent investigation of the complaint, officers identified and referred to court authorities for Damage to Property charges a 16 year-old Town of Friendship boy, a 16 year-old Fond du Lac boy and a 17 year-old Town of Friendship boy.

On November 30, police responded to a residence in the 300 block of Polk Street after a man reported that his girlfriend had slapped him during an argument. The 24 year-old woman was arrested for Battery/Domestic Abuse.

On December 1, police received information that a stolen debit card had been used at a North Pioneer Road business. The investigating officer determined that two purchases had been made by the suspect without the consent of the cardholder. A 23 year-old North Fond du Lac man was referred to the District Attorney's office for Fraudulent Use of a Credit Card.

On December 6, police received a report of a pick-up truck on Bechaud Avenue that had been damaged when someone threw an egg at the vehicle. An officer observed similar acts a few days later and identified three suspects in this incident. A 16 year-old Town of Friendship boy, a 16 year-old Fond du Lac boy and a 17 year-old Town of Friendship boy were referred to the District Attorney's office for Damage to Property and Disorderly Conduct.

On December 8, police received numerous reports of vehicles that had been egged on Harrison Street. An officer observed similar acts the next day and identified three suspects in this incident. A 16 year-old Town of Friendship boy, a 16 year-old Fond du Lac boy and a 17 year-old Town of Friendship boy were referred to the District Attorney's office for Damage to Property.

On December 9, an officer investigating previous incidents of vandalism, observed three boys egging a residence in the 1000 block of Bechaud Avenue. A 16 year-old Town of Friendship boy, a 16 year-old Fond du Lac boy and a 17 year-old Town of Friendship boy were referred to the District Attorney's office for Damage to Property.

Santa Claus

The North Fond du Lac Santa parade took place on Monday, December 13th. Santa Claus made his annual visit to North Fond du Lac, but because of the recent blizzard, was unable to drive through the community on the police department's Harley-Davidson motorcycle. Instead, Santa was chauffeured along the route in a department squad car.

Santa and his elves left the police department at 5:30. In addition to cruising through neighborhoods, Santa made brief stops at Prospect Park, LeMieux Park and Optimist Park to hand out candy canes to children. With bitter cold temperatures, only a few brave souls ventured out to meet with Santa at the parks. Many more children opted to meet with Santa at Spillman Library instead. The kids joined him there to make crafts, enjoy cookies and milk, and to listen to stories read by Santa. Parents also had the opportunity to get pictures of their children with Santa.



Traffic Stop Data Collection



In the past decade, the governor has twice appointed a committee to examine issues described as racial profiling and racial disparities in Wisconsin's criminal justice system. Both groups recommended collection of racial data when a traffic stop is made as one means to determine the extent to which people of different races may receive different treatment by law enforcement. Based primarily on concerns regarding the State's new primary seatbelt enforcement law and the possibility of it unfairly targeting racial minorities, the Wisconsin Legislature passed 2009 Wisconsin Act 28 which requires all law enforcement agencies to collect and submit traffic stop data.

Effective January 1, 2011, all Wisconsin law enforcement officers will be required to collect and submit data from traffic stops to determine: 1) whether the number of traffic stops between minorities and non-minorities is disproportionate and 2) whether the number of traffic stop searches between minorities and non-minorities is disproportionate. For all traffic stops; officers must collect and report stop data, vehicle data, occupant data, reason and outcome data, and search data (if applicable).

The Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance will compile and analyze the data collected from law enforcement. Reports by OJA of its analysis of traffic stop data will be released to the public at least once a year. The first report will be filed on or before July 1, 2012.

Unfortunately, while there is no doubt that collecting and reporting this data will result in additional costs for law enforcement, the State has not allocated any funding resources to accomplish compliance with the law. The impact of this unfunded mandate will vary by agency dependent upon circumstances and resources available.



Meet Officer Jacob Eagan

Officer Jacob Eagan recently began his career as a police officer with the Village of North Fond du Lac Police Department in April of 2010. Jacob attended Fox Valley Technical College, and graduated with an Associates Degree in Criminal Justice in May of 2009. Prior to coming to North Fond du Lac, Jacob was an Auxiliary Officer for Oshkosh Police Department during 2008, and worked in security for Aurora Health Care during 2009.

Officer Eagan was recently awarded the North Fond du Lac Police Department Medal of Meritorious Service award for demonstrating a remarkable commitment to the protection of life by willingly exposing himself to significant risk while trying to rescue a man trapped in a burning vehicle.

Jacob is currently assigned to second shift patrol, and is a member of the Department's Neighborhood Policing North Team.



Seniors And Law Enforcement Together (SALT)

Each year, hundreds of Fond du Lac County citizens age 60 and over are victims. Some find themselves fending off frauds, scams and abuse and struggling to maintain a safe, healthy quality of life.

SALT is a national organization dedicated to the prevention of victimization and increasing the quality of life of mature adults. For the past 11 years, a local group of dedicated and passionate volunteers, law enforcement officers, and community members have been part of SALT. They have worked to educate other seniors about potential victimization by organizing workshops and seminars and advocating for senior crime victims.

What Is SALT?

SALT: Seniors And Law Enforcement Together is an organization of law enforcement, older citizens, and community organizations who agree to work together to reduce criminal victimization and enhance the quality of life for seniors throughout Fond du Lac County. SALT works to improve the quality of life in our communities; promote programs to increase safety and reduce victimization, enhance the delivery of law enforcement services to mature adults and sponsors and distributes the File of Life. The local group came from a TRIAD of the local AARP, Fond du Lac Law Enforcement and the Fond du Lac community.

Many agencies partner with S.A.L.T, these include: A.A.R.P, Fond du Lac County Sheriff, Fond du Lac and North Fond du Lac Police and Fire Departments, Fond du Lac District Attorney, Department of Senior Services, Housing Authority. Fond du Lac County Executive, Fond du Lac City Manager, Fond du Lac Senior Center, North Fond du Lac Administrator, KFIZ, Agnesian, National Exchange Bank, Lake View, All About Life and others.

SALT's monthly meetings are open to interested seniors and other community organizations that cater to seniors, who want to become better informed regarding safety issues, fraud prevention, abuse, and preventing victimization. They welcome anyone who is interested and joining is pretty simple – just show up! There are no fees involved.

The next meeting is the Annual meeting to be held in the North Fond du Lac Community Center on January 18th at 7:30AM. This special meeting also includes breakfast for a nominal fee and reservations are required. Meetings are held half the year at the Sheriff's Office and the other half at the Fond du Lac Police Department.

Officers for the group are Chairman Ray Lapierre, Vice-Chairman Don Sears, treasurer Mary Meixensperger, and Fond du Lac Police Officer Steve Olson, secretary. One can also get the latest information on SALT's monthly radio program on KFIZ on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 10:30AM, as part of the Morning Show with Bob Hoffmaster. Guests talk about issues and topics of interest to seniors.

FILE OF LIFE

SALT is a proud sponsor and distributor of the FILE OF LIFE, an emergency medical information packet. Having a completed, updated File of Life can save valuable time in a medical emergency. It is a mini-medical history posted on the outside of your refrigerator.

The packet contains a decal for your house door/window to alert EMT's that you have the FILE OF LIFE on your refrigerator door and a red plastic packet held on the refrigerator by a magnet. There is also a compact version of the packet that can be carried with you in a wallet or purse. The FILE OF LIFE is available free of charge from S.A.L.T. or the NFDL Senior Center.

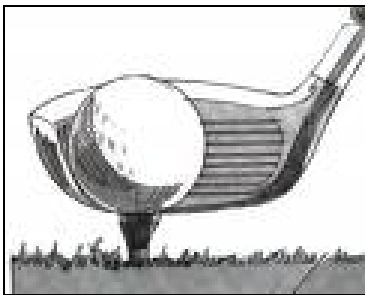
