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From the Administrator

In These Times

I, along with Village staff, am closely watching the events in Madison. I receive daily updates from several sources who are trying to interpret the minute by minute developments. Even with all the analysis, I don't feel we know much more than when the announcement of the Repair Bill was made several weeks ago. We are continuing to watch the daily events and will try to prepare for the outcome. We of course will follow any adopted state laws.

Several changes being discussed in Madison, if adopted, will have an effect on the Village finances. Four changes that would have the biggest impact are as follows:

- State Shared Revenue – Reduced by \$30,679
- State Transportation Aid – Reduced by \$51,205
- State Recycling Grant – Eliminated - \$24,000
- Wisconsin Retirement System Payments from employees – Increased by \$92,441

The total reduction in aid from the state, \$105,884 would be offset by the \$92,441 for a net shortfall of \$13,443. All of these numbers are preliminary and wouldn't be final until the Repair Bill is final and the bi-annual budget is adopted. When the Governor talks about tools that he will provide to the municipalities to offset the reduced revenue from the state, he is referring to the municipal employees paying part of the retirement cost, thus alleviating a portion of the cost from the municipality. There have been several view points as to whether labor contracts supercede the Repair Bill that, as of this writing of this article, has not been passed. Based on the latest legal advice, the only employees that would be exempt from sharing in the retirement payments would be the non-supervisor Police Patrol Officers and the School Resource Officer.

The topic that is generating even greater attention in Madison is labor negotiation or bargaining rights. The Village has three labor unions representing our Police Dept, Public Works, and Clerical staff. The WPPA/SORD represents our Police Sergeants, the WPPA/LEER represents our Police Officers, and the AFSCME represents our Public Works and Clerical staff. All three have signed contracts through 2012. This is being hotly debated with no idea as to when it will be rejected or adopted.

Switching topics, we were fortunate to have three candidates running for two positions on the Village Board. A forum held on Monday March 28th, gave people in the audience and Charter Cable viewers a chance to hear each candidate's views on key issues

in the Village. Congratulations to Mike Will and Mike Stretar for being re-elected to the Village Trustee positions. The Village had a very good turnout with around 38% of the registered voters voting.

For those who do watch our televised board meetings, we have been struggling to find the problem with the audio. It at times seems to work well and other times not so well. We are making some additional changes that will hopefully correct the problem and allow for a clear broadcast of the meetings held the first and third Mondays of the month at 6:00pm.

The Village is doing a little remodeling at the Village offices and Community Center. Our Municipal Court is outgrowing the space at the Municipal Offices so Courts will be held at the Community Center on Thursday afternoons. This will also alleviate parking problems during court sessions. The Court offices are still at the Village office building. We are remodeling some areas within the Village offices to make better use of the space we have. Storage is always a problem. We have torn out a couple walls and built additional storage space which hopefully will provide sufficient space for some time.

VILLAGE SURVEY RESULTS

One hundred fifty two (152) persons returned the Village survey. Of the 140 participants who did the prioritize section, clearly Quality of Life came in first, Prospect Avenue second and Wisconsin Avenue third. When counting ratings of first and second priority, Quality of Life had 96 ratings of 1st or 2nd priority; Prospect Avenue had 77 ratings of 1st or 2nd, and Wisconsin Avenue came in third with 53 persons surveyed rating it 1st or 2nd priority. Recreation had 30, and Waterfront 22 ratings of 1st or 2nd.

Farmer's Market had a great response with 129 out of 150 people wanting one. Twenty people are interested in a community garden.

What do Village citizens mean by "Quality of Life"? Staff discussions have begun, to try to answer that question, and to respond to some of the specific comments made. We are initially looking for projects and that don't cost much, and respond to citizen interests.

There were over one hundred comments and suggestions made. A few people expressed an interest and willingness to get involved, but we do not have their names. So, as we proceed, please stay in touch! Based on the comments, we are looking into the Farmer's Market, a Welcome Wagon, and ways to fight and remove blight, including code enforcement, and planting flowers and trees. (Notice request for people to help with plantings on page one.) There is a NO OUTLET sign being placed on Parkridge Lane.

Comments Summary: Support the pool; more businesses; eliminate blighted properties and blighting influences; repair streets and pipes; emphasize the railroad history and theme; restore ice skating rink; restaurant, coffee shop, fast food; grocery store; jogging trail; bike trail to Lakeside Park; expand the library; promote our schools; more housing development; more activities for children and youth; more activities for families; ways to help elders with lawn care and snow removal; ways to get to know neighbors, meet and greet; music; utilize the community center for more community-wide events. Also, cut the budget; lower water rates; reduce Village staff; fewer police.

We will post all the comments on our website. Please know that each comment is valued, and that staff do understand and recognize the hardships that many face. We also recognize based on the comments all the little things that can be done or organized to enhance our quality of life. *Help us define that together, and knit ourselves into everything we can be as a thriving community! Thanks for your involvement!!!!*

NOTICE

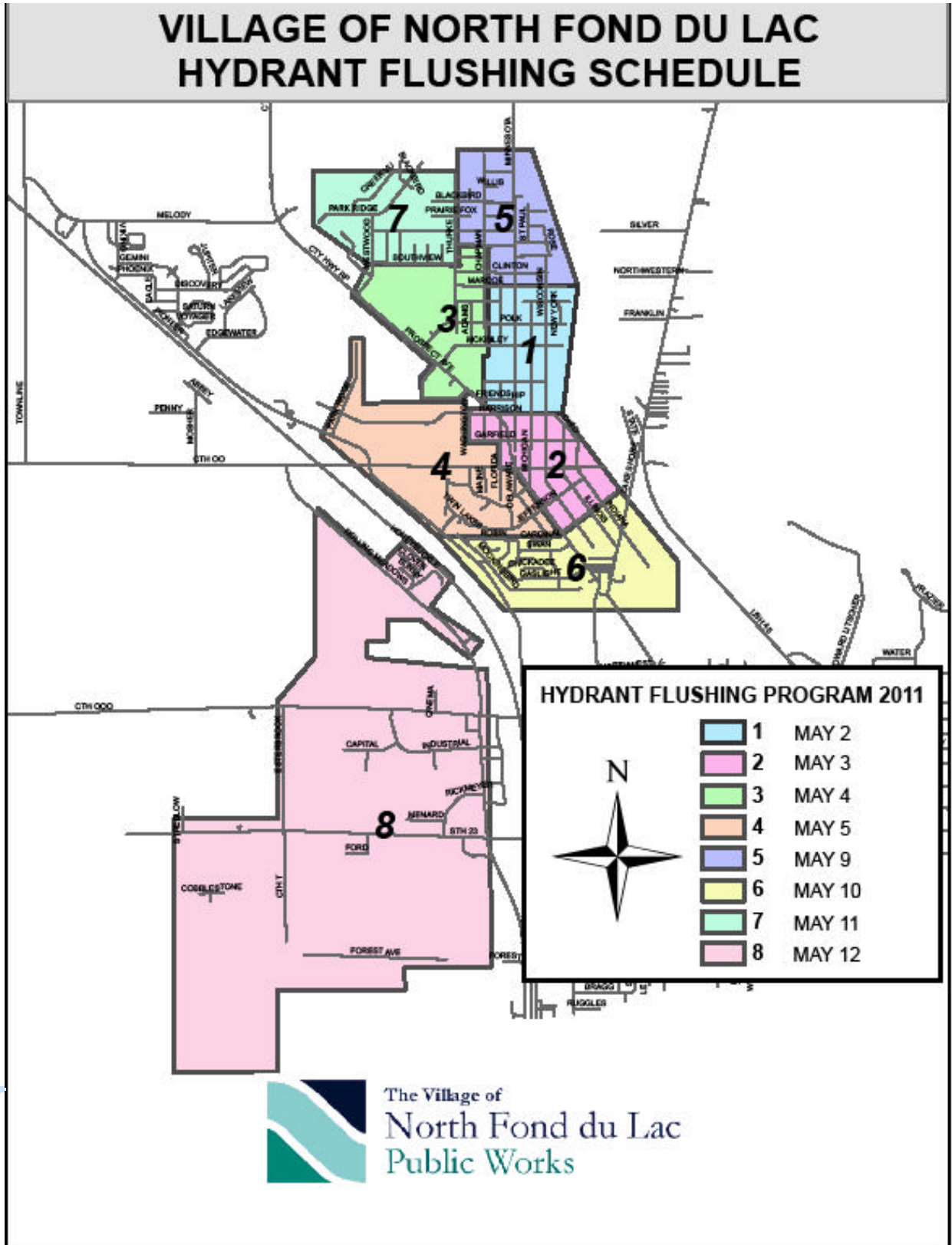
The Public Works Department will be flushing water mains and hydrants between May 2nd and May 12th. Flushing of the mains removes deposits of iron and minerals that are harmless but may affect the color, odor, and taste of the water. Also, it allows the department to exercise and maintain hydrants to keep them working properly.

Flushing will be done from 6:00 am – 4:30 pm each day in different zones of the village according to a set schedule. Please refer to the zone map and schedule below to determine when flushing will be done in your area.

- When you see men working or water flushing from hydrants in your area, use little or no water for 30-45 minutes to ensure that the water has settled down and that the discoloration is not drawn into your home.
- If you come home and find discoloration in your water, draw the discolored water off through the COLD WATER TAP ONLY. *Do not run your icemaker, dishwasher, or washing machine until the discolored water has been drawn off, to avoid staining to your water heater or laundry.*

Prescription Drug "Take Back"

The Police Department will be taking part in a nationwide prescription drug "Take Back" initiative that seeks to prevent increased pill abuse and theft. We will be collecting potentially dangerous expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs for destruction at

The service is free and anonymous; no questions asked.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Many Americans are not aware that medicines that remain in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are increasing at alarming rates, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, many Americans do not know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them down the toilet or throwing them away - both potential safety and health hazards.

This collaborative nationwide effort, headed by the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), will help eliminate a major source of abused prescription drugs and reduce the dangers they pose to public safety and the environment.

Responsible Pet Ownership

Any person owning or having charge, custody, care or control of any dog shall keep the dog inside an enclosed structure, upon an appropriate chain or tie no less than six feet in length, in an enclosed yard which is either walled or fenced, or in any other appropriate restraining enclosure. Additionally, no enclosure, tie or chain shall allow the dog to be within six feet of any street, sidewalk, public way or neighbor's driveway. Furthermore, public access to one entrance of the owner's residence or business must be provided without interference from such dog.

A dog may remain within the owner's rear yard under the personal, immediate and direct supervision of the owner or other person who is physically present and able to control the dog by voice command. The rear yard is that area behind a house or other structure, which is



separated from all public streets and sidewalks by a residence or similar building.

While walking, dogs shall be restrained by an appropriate leash, not exceeding six feet in length, in the hands of a person directly controlling the movement of such dog; and that person must be of sufficient strength to physically control such dog. Ordinances also prohibit allowing pets in any village parks or recreational areas.

Anyone in violation of pet control ordinances may be fined between \$50 and \$500 for each offense. The Police Department urges all pet owners to be responsible for their pets to alleviate any violations. If you have a pet control problem or concern in your neighborhood, please contact the North Fond du Lac Police Department immediately, so we may correct the problem. We can be reached at 906-5555.

Please Bring In Your Hazardous Materials- Any product that is out-of-date or otherwise not in use has the potential to "hazardous." These items are typically found in your barn, basement, garage, craft area, workshop, under the sink, etc. Look key words on the label such as— CAUTION • WARNING • DANGER • POISON • FLAMMABLE • COMBUSTIBLE • CORROSIVE

Safe Transport- Hazardous waste should be brought in the original containers whenever possible. Do not mix chemicals. To prepare mater for transport, place them in a box or sturdy container to prevent spills or breakage. If you believe the materials are dangerous to transp contact Fond du Lac County UWEX as soon as possible. Veolia may be able to arrange a pick-up.

Acceptable Materials

Plant, pest, yard maintenance chemicals—

Pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, insecticides, fungicides, rodenticides, and other poisonous repellents and banned chemicals (like DDT).

Solvents and Craft Supplies—

Varnishes, shellacs, turpentine, thinners, lead based paints, oil paint, aerosol paints, nail polish, wood preservatives, wood coating, stripping, and preservative chemicals. *No Latex Paint.*

Cleaners and cleansers—

Oven cleaners, spot removers, polishes, pool/spa chemicals, and moth balls.



Automotive and vehicle products—

Contaminated oil, hydraulic oil, antifreeze, and gaso-line. *Waste oil should be kept separate and will be recycled.*

Mercury and other products—

Bulk mercury and mercury containing devices such as thermometers and thermostats, nicad rechargeable batteries, lead acid batteries, mercury button batteries, acids and bases, and photographic chemicals. *A digital thermometer will be offered in exchange for mercury thermometers while supplies last.*

Unacceptable Items

The following materials **will not be accepted.**

Acceptable Electronics

Monitors, terminals, CPUs, laptops, docking stations, printer/toner cartridges, copy machines, fa machines, fax cartridges, printers, TVs, MP3 players iPods, cellular phones, hard-wired phones, circu boards, wire/cabling, cash registers, keyboards, mice, telecommunication equipment, audiovisu equipment, stereo equipment, uninterrupted power sup plies, video boards, glucose testers, medical equipment, game consoles, DVD/VHS players, mainframe equip ment, mid-range equipment, networking equipment, GF units, other computer peripherals, and microwaves.

Who is collecting the electronics? How safe is my computer data?

For a fee of \$10, 5R Processors, Ltd., a registered recycler under the E-Cycle Wisconsin program, will do a Department of Defense-approved hard drive wipe and send a certificate of data destruction to you after it is completed at their facility in Ladysmith, WI. To expedite the process, please come with your name and address written legibly on an index card.

Why recycle electronics? The 2010 E-Cycle Wisconsin law bans certain electronics from being land-filled or incinerated. It requires manufacturers, recyclers, and collectors to recycle in an environmentally sound manner. The law takes a product stewardship approach, assigning primary responsibility for collection and recycling to the manufacturer. This means that recycling costs are not paid by the consumer but by the manufacturers that make the products.

Project funding provided by: Wisc. Dept. of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection; Veolia Waste Services; 5R Processors Ltd.; and Fond du Lac County.

Participation Guidelines *All Fond du Lac County and all City of Waupun residents, businesses, schools, and farms are eligible to participate. There is a \$5 charge per vehicle this year, as stated below:*

Households— Hazardous Waste & Electronics: \$5 per vehicle regardless of type or quantity of materials brought. Cash Only.

Farms—Hazardous Waste & Electronics: Pre-register by contacting the Fond du Lac County UWEX office by May 6 with the type and quantity of materials. \$5 per vehicle collected at the event. Cash Only.

Businesses—Hazardous Waste: Pre-register by contacting the Fond du Lac County UWEX office by May 6 with the type and quantity of hazardous waste. Veolia will give a no-obligation cost estimate prior to the event. Businesses pay a reduced rate and receive discounts for large quantities. \$5 per vehicle collected at the event. Cash Only.

Businesses—Electronics: Contact 5R Processors directly at (715) 532-2050 for a no-obligation estimate.

K-12 Schools—Hazardous Waste: Pre-register by contacting the Fond du Lac County UWEX office by May 6 with the type and quantity of hazardous waste. 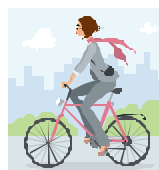
Bicycle Safety

According to the US Consumer Product Safety Commission, each year, there are about 200 bicycle-related deaths in the United States and another half a million bicycle-related injuries treated in hospital emergency rooms. To reduce injuries, the North Fond du Lac Police Department encourages riders of all ages to use helmets. Studies have shown that using bicycle helmets can reduce head injuries by up to 85 percent. Riders should wear the helmet flat atop the head; not tilted back at an angle. The helmet should fit snugly and should not obstruct the rider's field of vision. Always wear the helmet with the chin strap firmly buckled.

Along with using safety equipment, rider actions and reactions play a major role in contributing to injury-free cycling enjoyment. Follow these additional safety tips to help ensure safe summer cycling.

- See and be seen...Wear bright fluorescent colors during the day.
- Avoid biking at night...If riding at night, equip your bicycle with head and tail lights and wear reflective clothing.
- Stay alert...Keep a lookout for obstacles in your path.
- Go with the flow...Ride with traffic.
- Check for traffic...Be aware of traffic around you.
- Learn the rules of the road...Obey traffic laws. Traffic laws are the same for bicycles and cars.

It is important that children are exposed to safe riding habits. It is not enough that parents talk to their children about bike safety. Parents must lead by example. Keep bike riding safe for yourself, and for your family.

.Immunizations: They are Important!

Minnesota has recently experienced as outbreak of measles and the Fond du Lac County Health Department would like to remind all parents to be sure their children are up to date with all of their childhood vaccines, especially the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine.

As of March 30, 2011 there are 14 confirmed cases of measles in MN with, 8 of the cases requiring hospitalization. Disease complications can occur in about a third of those infected with measles. Six to 20 percent of the people who get the disease will get an ear infection, diarrhea, or even pneumonia. One out of 1000 people with measles will develop encephalitis (a severe inflammation of the brain), and about one out of 1000 will die.

The Fond du Lac County Health Department offers all recommended childhood vaccines at no charge to Fond du Lac County residents 18 and younger. Wisconsin's 'Absolute Sobriety Law' means not a drop of alcohol for drivers under age 21.

With the arrival of spring, many young people will be celebrating at proms, graduations, weddings, and other festivities.



While they're partying, young drivers may be tempted to get behind the wheel after drinking. However, they must resist this temptation because Wisconsin law requires drivers under the age of 21 to maintain absolute sobriety—not even a drop of alcohol allowed—when operating a motor vehicle.

Drivers under age 21 who are convicted of violating Wisconsin's Absolute Sobriety Law will have their license suspended for three months and must pay a \$389.50 citation with four demerit points assessed on their license. If a passenger under the age of 16 is in the vehicle, the forfeiture cost and period of suspension are doubled.

Good decision-making and driving skills are easily impaired with just a small amount of alcohol at any age. But young people, who tend to take more risks and generally have less driving experience, are especially susceptible to traffic crashes after drinking. In Wisconsin, traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for young people. And as warmer weather arrives and the party season begins, we don't want to lose them because of a disastrous decision, like drinking and driving.

Fond du Lac County – Work Zone Awareness

With the end of the winter season comes the start of the construction season in Wisconsin. On an average, over 10 people per year lose their lives and over 1700 crashes occur in Wisconsin in construction/maintenance work zones. It's not just workers doing the maintenance or construction in these zones who become victims; more times than not, the drivers themselves are severely injured or killed as well. With the amount of highway construction that goes on throughout Wisconsin, everyone needs to pay special attention when approaching or in a work zone. Some of the additional obstacles in work zones are driving lanes become narrower with lane shifts and uneven pavements – this makes navigation even more challenging. Construction workers along with construction equipment and trucks work sometimes within feet of the live moving traffic. This doesn't allow for much reaction time if you are not paying full attention and traveling over the speed limit. For the safety of all - pay attention, be patient, and slow down while operating a vehicle on the highways within work zones.

There was an event scheduled in Green Bay at Lambeau Field on April 12, which included The Work Zone Memorial Wall, which honors individuals killed in a work zone, including Fond du Lac County's Dennis Roeseler, killed on Dec. 18, 2003 along US 41.

The Fond du Lac County WIC Program currently is taking applications for pregnant, breastfeeding, and postpartum women, & families with infants and children under the age of 5. WIC provides nutrition, health, and breastfeeding education and breastfeeding support to our families as well as referral services to other agencies. Monthly vouchers are given on the day of the appointment for families to purchase milk, juice, cereal, eggs, peanut butter, beans and peas, whole grains, fruits and vegetables, baby formula and jars of baby foods. Breastfeeding mothers receive additional food benefits. Each family can also receive \$15 in Farmer's Market vouchers to use at local farmer's markets from June-October.

To be eligible a family needs to meet Federal income guidelines. An example of the income guideline for a family of four is: Weekly Gross income of \$785 or a Biweekly Gross income of \$1569. The income guidelines will be increasing on July 1, 2011. Many working families qualify for WIC. Call 920-929-3104 to see if you qualify and to apply for the WIC Program. Don't Become a Victim - Keep Yourself, Your Family & Your Property Safe

Many property crimes such as residential burglaries and thefts from automobiles can be avoided. To keep yourself, your loved ones and your property safest from criminals, conduct a self-assessment and keep the following advice in mind.

Trim trees and shrubs near your doors and windows, and avoid installing a high privacy fence around your yard. High fences and shrubbery can add to your privacy, but they can also help conceal a prowler from neighbors and passers-by. Exterior lights, mounted out of easy reach, can reduce the darkness a burglar finds desirable.

Time is a burglar's enemy, too. A burglar delayed for four or five minutes is apt to give up and try for another, less difficult location. Simple security devices -- including such equipment as padlocks, door and window locks, bars and bolts -- can deter intruders and keep them from choosing your house.

Noise is also a great way to deter the burglar. Many types of alarm systems are available, with detectors to be mounted on doors and windows. Deciding just how much home protection you need -- and can afford -- is a personal judgment. A wide range of systems is available today to suit the needs and pocketbook of any homeowner.

Consider rearranging your furnishings and decor to make your home less inviting to criminals. Try to avoid placing your belongings in a location that makes them easily noticeable and identifiable from outside. In other words, don't tempt criminals looking for a quick and easy score.

Outside doors should be metal or solid hardwood, and at least 1 3/4 inches thick. Frames must be made of equally strong material, and each door must fit its frame securely. Remember, if it is placed in a weak door, even the most efficient lock will not keep out a determined burglar. Deadbolt locks are best.

Here are some "home security habits" to develop and practice:

- Make sure that doors and windows are locked and alarm systems are turned on whenever leaving the house and when going to bed at night.

- Don't carry house keys on a key ring bearing your home address or leave house keys with your car in a commercial parking lot. Don't hide your keys in "secret" places outside your home - burglars usually know where to look.

When going on vacation, have mail and packages picked up, forwarded or held by the post office. Lower the sound of your telephone ringer so it can't be heard outside. Arrange to have your lawn mowed or your walk shoveled. Stop newspaper deliveries. Use automatic timers to turn lights on and off in your living room and bedrooms at appropriate times. Tell police and trusted neighbors when you plan to be away and join with your neighbors to keep a close watch on what's happening in your area.



Motorists should take the necessary steps to keep themselves and their property safe from criminals.

Whether traveling in the car or leaving it parked, following this advice can prevent you from becoming a victim:

- Be sure to lock your doors and keep windows closed when driving. Criminals can suddenly enter unlocked vehicles when stopped.
- Always be aware of your surroundings. If someone is nearby, acting suspiciously, stay inside your car and leave the area.
- If a stranger attempts to enter your car, honk the horn repeatedly to draw attention to yourself and perhaps frighten them away.
- When parking in a parking ramp, choose well-lit areas nearest entrance and exit points.
- Always peek into the backseat before getting into your car.
- Never pick up a hitchhiker or offer a ride to a stranger - even the most innocent looking person can be out to hurt you or take your car.
- Make sure doors are locked and windows are closed when exiting your car.
- Park in well lit areas, near other cars.
- Keep valuables out of sight, preferably locked in the trunk.

Tornado Awareness and Safety Tips

A tornado is one of nature's most violent and powerful storms. These massive, rotating funnels of air come down to earth within seconds, usually with only short warning. Sometimes a tornado may not even be visible. On average, Wisconsin experiences 21 tornadoes each year. Tornadoes can occur any time of year, at any time of day. In Wisconsin, peak tornado season is April to August, with most tornadoes occurring between 4pm and 9pm.

A **TORNADO WATCH** is to indicate that a tornado is possibly in the area due to weather conditions. At this point, you should remain alert for approaching storms. The conditions exist in the atmosphere, which are capable of producing funnel clouds.

A **TORNADO WARNING** is much more serious. A warning indicates that a tornado has been sighted in the area. If a tornado warning is issued or if you see a tornado, move to a pre-designated safety place immediately. Remember, tornadoes are more likely to develop in an area where a severe thunderstorm watch or warning is in effect. Listen to local radio and television stations for updated storm information.

If a Warning is issued or if threatening weather approaches:

- Mobile homes offer little protection from tornadoes and should be abandoned in exchange for your mobile home community's tornado shelter. In North Fond du Lac; the shelter for residents of Gaslight Terrace, Lakeshore Terrace and Green Meadows is located on Oriole Parkway in Gaslight Terrace.



- In a home or building, move to a pre-designated shelter, such as a basement.
- If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture.
- Stay away from windows.
- Get out of automobiles and lie in a low ditch, protecting your head from flying debris. Do not try to outrun a tornado. Funnel clouds are unpredictable and move very quickly, so you may drive directly into the eye/center of it.

Environmental conditions normally associated with tornadoes include dark greenish skies, a wall cloud, large hail, or a loud roar, similar to a train. A wall cloud can prevent people from viewing the funnel cloud.

Despite what some may believe, tornadoes can appear from any direction. Most move from southwest to northeast, or west to east, but not always. Some tornadoes change direction in the course of their destruction, or even backtrack. Tornadoes can last from several seconds to more than an hour. However, most tornadoes last less than 10 minutes. Some people think that tornadoes only strike in certain places but in reality there is no place in Wisconsin that is safe from tornadoes.

Develop an action plan before severe weather strikes. People most at risk are those in mobile home, automobiles, the elderly or very young, the physically or mentally impaired, and people who may not understand the warning due to a language barrier. Remember to plan for transportation assistance for those individuals unable to get themselves to shelter. In the event of severe weather, emergency services personnel may not be able to get them for an extended period of time.

The best way to keep safe during the tornado season is: Be aware and be prepared. For additional storm safety tips, check out <http://www.spc.noaa.gov/fao/tornado/safetv.html>.

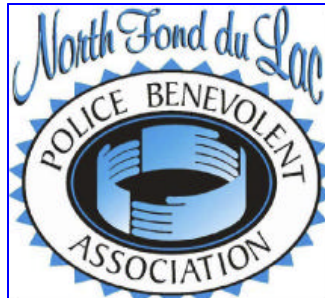

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The initial **experience** will include the following examinations:



1). **Periodontal**--- where you will discover how the teeth/gums are designed, how teeth fit into the bone; how you will maintain the gum tissue to assure you’ll NEVER have **tooth decay, gum disease, or odor** in your mouth.



2). **Dental (tooth examination)**---We’ll examine the existing teeth; discuss any concerns you may have and possible solutions; and discuss long range options for restoring your dental health.

3). **Oral Cancer Screening**--- Oral cancer is more common than cervical cancer. Both are curable **IF** detected early. Prevention is the key. A yearly oral cancer screening is recommended for all.
