New Traffic Laws for 2010

Currently, U-turns are prohibited at all controlled intersections. This all changes on January 1, 2010. Wisconsin Act 97 will permit U-turns at controlled intersections unless signs are installed to indicate the maneuver is prohibited. The U-turn must be made from the leftmost turn lane in the same fashion as a conventional left turn. Vehicles on the intersecting street attempting to turn right-on-red must yield to the U-turning vehicle.

No backing will be permitted as part of the U-turn, so drivers will have to be familiar with their vehicle's turning radius. U-turns will also be prohibited on curves and hillcrests where visibility is less than 500 feet.

The new U-turn law will help traffic engineers in controlling traffic on divided highways. It will also reduce issues/costs associated with condemnation where highway projects result in median closings, since reasonable access to businesses and residences across the highway median should now be possible via U-turns.

Also under Act 97, passing a left-turning vehicle on the right using a **PAVED** shoulder will be permitted. This does not mean that a driver can pass a slower-moving vehicle on the right using the shoulder – the vehicle being passed **MUST** be making a left turn.

Safe Routes to School

The bright green and reflective signs located at school crossings and reminding motorists of the high likelihood of the presence of children and the need to slow down have been in place now for a couple of years. The safety of our children is obviously important not only to the police department, but the school district and residents, as well. A pedestrian generally has the right of way over all vehicles while at the curb or in a crosswalk. This means that cars and other vehicle traffic (buses, trucks, motorcycles, bicycles, etc.) must slow down or stop in front of a crosswalk when a pedestrian is using or is about to use a crosswalk. Vehicles must remain stopped until the pedestrian has fully crossed the street. Furthermore, vehicles may not pass other vehicles which are stopped or paused at a crosswalk.

A number of incidents have been reported to police involving motorists failing to yield to pedestrians at several of these crossings, especially the crossing on Prospect Avenue near the high school practice athletic field. With the higher speed limit on Prospect Avenue it is very important that motorists slow down and wait for children crossing the street. Officers will be placing a strong emphasis on monitoring traffic in these areas during school hours and will be strictly enforcing traffic safety regulations. The fines for failure to yield to a pedestrian start at \$83.80.

The school district and the police department worked together to determine where the markers would be most valuable. In order to provide safe routes for each of the schools in the district, the markers are posted in areas of Thurke Avenue and Broadway Street (Friendship Learning Center), McKinley Street and Chapman Avenue, Prospect Avenue between McKinley Street and Harrison Street (North Fond du Lac Middle & High Schools), Minnesota Avenue and McKinley Street, and Minnesota Avenue and Cleveland Street (Early Learning Center). Parents should encourage children to cross at these high visibility areas.

2008 ANNUAL REPORT

The following information is a summary of the 2008 Annual Report on police department activity and operations in the Village of North Fond du Lac. All of the department's annual reports can be viewed on our website (www.nfdl.org).

Overall, the number of crime and incidents that the police department received reports of and/or generated decreased by 12% from 2007 to 2008. In 2007 the police department registered 4,455 crime/incident reports and that number decreased to 3,918 in 2008. A categorical breakdown of those crime/incident reports is as follows:

As is the case in most years, there were some fairly significant changes in crime and related incidents in our community from one year to the next. Some of the more noteworthy changes and trends are as follows:

The 'Crimes Against Persons' category increased very slightly from 2007 but that growth, unfortunately, represents an approximate increase of 20% over 2006 (105 incidents). This category of crimes/incidents represents some of the most serious offenses that get reported to us (sexual assaults, child abuse and neglect, battery/physical assaults, intimidation of a victim or witness, etc.). So, this is obviously not a statistic that we are pleased to see.

On a very positive note, the 'Crimes Against Property' category decreased by 16% from 2007; and an overall decrease of approximately 25% from 2006 (291 incidents).

Other categories on a continuing downward trend include:

- Crimes Against Peace/Order, which decreased 3% from 2007, and is an overall decrease of approximately 21% from 2006 (619 incidents).
- Juvenile Incidents, which decreased 3% from 2007, and is an overall decrease of approximately 47% from 2006 (210 incidents).

2008 represents the second year in a row that the overall number of crimes/incidents decreased; 2.8% decrease from 2006 to 2007, and another 12% from 2007 to 2008. Given the fact that a lot of these numbers also represent the numbers of persons that were the victim of a crime in our community, we're obviously very pleased that we can report two consecutive years of overall decreases. We, as a community, should be very proud of that statistic for two reasons in particular: First, the economic environment that we've been in; every economic downturn in the history of our nation has produced an increase in crime. Second, the community has grown by nearly 10% since 2000. As a matter of fact, the Village of North Fond du Lac has experienced the most rapid rate of growth of any community in Fond du Lac

County since that time.

Although the number of property crimes decreased from 2007 to 2008 the value of stolen property actually increased substantially – the value of stolen property reported to the Police Department in 2007 was \$64,625, and in 2008 it was \$162,288. It should be noted that, of the \$162,288 worth of property stolen in 2008, \$40,465 was stolen in one burglary and another \$88,250 was stolen in one theft.

The combined total of arrests and citations generated by the department in 2008 was 1,170. That number increased by 15% over 2007's total of 998.

The number of criminal arrests (which are basically arrests for more serious offenses) made by the department remained about the same as the previous year; 330 in 2008 compared to 338 in 2007. Of the 330 criminal arrests made in 2008, 242 were for non-traffic related offenses and 58 were for traffic violations. Although the types of criminal arrests made by the department varied greatly, some of the more common types of offenses that lead to the arrests were sexual assaults, drug offenses, battery/assaults, disorderly conduct, thefts, criminal damage to property, and warrant apprehensions. The criminal traffic offense arrests were primarily related to operating while intoxicated (2nd offense or greater) and operating after revocation.

The 840 citations that were issued in 2008 (for ordinance and traffic violations) is an increase of approximately 11% over 2007 (660 citations). Of the 840 citations that were issued in 2008, 41% (348) of those citations were issued for non-traffic related offenses. As with the criminal arrests, the offenses which resulted in the issuance of citations varied greatly. Many of those non-traffic related citations were issued for the following types of unlawful acts or behavior; drug offenses, disorderly conduct, underage alcohol related violations, and truancy. The remaining 59% (492) of those citations were issued for traffic related offenses. Many of those traffic related citations were issued for operating a motor vehicle with a suspended license, operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (1st offense), failure to stop at a stop sign, speeding, non-registration of a motor vehicle, seatbelt violations, and operating a vehicle with suspended registration.

There were 102 motor vehicle accidents in the community in 2008. That number represents an increase of 1% over 2007 when we had 101 accidents. One person was killed in one of those accidents and 3 injuries were sustained in others. Of the 102 accidents in 2008, 59 were reportable (more severe) and 43 were non-reportable. Twelve of those accidents were hit and runs.

The factors that contributed most to motor vehicle accidents in our community were unsafe backing, inattentive driving, and failure to yield right of way. Here are some additional facts and figures regarding traffic accidents in our community in 2008:

- The day of the week with the highest incidence rate for accidents was Tuesday.
- The age group that caused the highest number of accidents was 36-55, with the 15-18 year old group in a very close second place.
- The peak time of day for accidents was between 3:00PM and 4:00PM and again between 5:00PM and 6:00PM.
- Male drivers were “at fault” in accidents approximately 21% more often than female drivers.

The department issued 340 parking tickets in 2008, compared to 208 in 2007.

On October 3, a student at Horace Mann High School reported that someone had stolen her purse, which contained a cell phone and cash, while she was at the Homecoming Dance. No arrests have been made.

On October 15, the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department notified North Fond du Lac police that a stolen credit card had been used at a Prospect Av. Business. No arrests have been made and police are trying to locate the suspect.

On October 18, police received a report that a gold with black trim Next brand BMX bike had been stolen from the yard of a residence in the 600 block of Michigan Av. No arrests have been made.

On October 18, a resident in the 700 block of Florida Av reported that someone had stolen a 16GB Apple iPod Touch from his bedroom. No arrests have been made.

On October 20, a student at Horace Mann High School reported that someone had stolen her LG Envy Touch cell phone from a bag in her physical locker. No arrests have been made.

These cases are just some of the incidents that have been successfully resolved. It is our hope that by making you aware of incidents that have occurred in your community, you will be better prepared to protect yourself and your property from similar incidents.

On September 20, a woman sought police assistance in trying to locate her 16 year-old son at a Harrison St apartment. Police found the boy, his 16 year-old friend and a 17 year-old girl drinking alcohol at the residence. All three juveniles were cited for underage drinking and the 23 year-old tenant was cited for permitting underage people to drink alcohol.

On September 24, an anonymous caller in the 100 block of Clinton St contacted police after hearing someone yelling for help. Police identified and arrested an 18 year-old man for disorderly conduct / domestic abuse after learning that he had grabbed hold of and held his 57 year-old father against his will.

On September 30, a 13 year-old boy was referred to Juvenile Court Services for Battery after kicking a 13 year-old girl and striking her repeatedly with his backpack while she was walking on Minnesota Av.

On October 7, police were notified that an iPod had been stolen from inside a shirt pocket in the commons at Horace Mann High School. Police identified and issued citations to two 16 year-old boys and two 16 year-old girls for their roles in the theft.

On October 8, during a routine traffic stop, police identified a 35 year-old passenger in the vehicle had an outstanding warrant for his arrest. The man was taken into custody on the warrant.

On October 11, a 25 year-old woman and a 26 year-old woman were cited for disorderly conduct after a verbal argument escalated into a physical altercation inside a Wisconsin Av tavern.

On October 15, 31 year-old man was arrested for strangulation, battery and disorderly conduct / domestic abuse following a physical altercation with his domestic partner and the partner's mother at their residence in the 1200 block of Bechaud Av.

On October 20, the School resource Officer at Horace Mann High School issued a citation for disorderly conduct to a 14 year-old boy after he swore at the principal and kicked chairs in the commons at the school.

On October 22, the police department received a report from several girls at Bessie Allen Middle School that they were being inappropriately touched by a 13 year-old boy at the school. The boy was referred to Juvenile Court Services for 2nd Degree Sexual Assault.

On November 6, the manager of a Harrison St apartment complex reported to police that someone had sprayed several dry chemical fire extinguishers throughout the mail room inside one of the buildings and had broken a fence in the parking lot. The investigating officer identified a 16 year-old boy who was responsible for the damage and issued him a citation for deface / destroy property.

On November 13, police were called to a residence on Robin Dr in Gaslight Terrace by witnesses who reported that a woman had struck a mailbox with her car before leaving the scene of the accident on foot. Police located the 51 year-old woman and issued her citations for hit & run and failure to notify police of an accident. The woman's 25 year-old son was also arrested on an outstanding arrest warrant.

On November 13, officers responded to a report from a motorist of a vehicle being driven erratically on Highway 45. Responding officers located the suspect vehicle and observed several traffic violations. The officers stopped the vehicle and arrested the 42 year-old driver for 3rd Offense drunk driving.

On November 19, an officer on patrol observed a man attempting to push a vehicle out of the roadway on Winnebago St. The officer stopped to help and discovered that the 19 year-old man had been drinking alcohol and had an active arrest

On November 19, officers responded to Horace Mann High School after an 18 year-old student threatened to place a bomb under the principal's car. The 18 year-old boy was arrested for disorderly conduct and held in the Fond du Lac County Jail. He was apparently upset about his cell phone having been taken away during class.

On November 24, the School Resource Officer was notified that a 12 year-old boy had been showing a knife to other students in the cafeteria at Bessie Allen Middle School. The boy was referred to Juvenile Court Services for possessing a dangerous weapon on school property.

On November 25, a woman notified police that two boys had threatened to harass and intimidate staff at Horace Mann High School with an Airsoft gun. When located, the 14 and 15 year-old boys were issued citations for disorderly conduct.

On December 1, police were notified that two small children had been left home alone when their parents went to work. Officers located a 2 year-old boy home alone at the residence and determined that his 7 year-old sister had also been left home alone until she was picked up by the school bus. Their 26 year-old mother was referred to the District Attorney for Child Neglect.

On December 2, police were notified that a 16 year-old boy had given pornographic pictures to a 14 year-old boy at Horace Mann High School. The 16 year-old was referred to Juvenile Court services for exposing a child to harmful material.

On December 4, an officer on patrol discovered a large group of underage people drinking alcohol at a residence in the 1700 block of Park Ridge Ln. Officers issued citations for underage drinking to 12 underage people at the residence. Officers also issued 12 citations for permitting underage drinking to the 44 year-old homeowner who was present while the underage people were drinking there.

Those Who Host, Lose The Most

Did you know that in Wisconsin, parents who host an underage drinking party can end up serving nine months in jail and paying fines as high as \$10,000? Simply put, parents who host, allow or fail to prevent underage drinking are taking the risk of spending time in jail.

"Parents Who Host, Lose the Most" is the clear and consistent message the North Fond du Lac Police Department is sending in an effort to raise public awareness about the laws and harmful effects of teen drinking.

"Underage drinking is more complex an issue than liability to parents. We want to get the community talking about how alcohol consumption affects young minds," Chief Bill Lamb said. "Studies show drinking alcohol as a teenager has an impact on brain development and that early drinking has lasting health implications. We want to help parents understand that the younger a person is when he or she takes that first drink, the higher the risk that person will develop long-term problems with alcohol. We want them to view alcohol consumption among teens as the serious health epidemic that it has become in our communities." Along with its enormous emotional toll on families and communities, the United States Department of Justice estimates that alcohol use by underage drinkers results in approximately \$3.7 billion a year in medical costs due to traffic crashes, crime, suicide attempts and related consequences.

In a 2003 survey conducted by the Center for Alcohol Marketing and Youth, only 31 percent of parents of 15 to 16 year-old teenagers believed their child had a drink in the past year, compared to the 60 percent of teens in that age group who reported drinking

"As a community, we need to come together and realize teen drinking is a problem and develop some solutions," Lamb continued. "We need to refuse to allow teen drinking and we need to refuse to supply teens with alcohol. We can't rely only on law enforcement to break up every underage drinking party. This is a parental issue and a community health issue. We need the support of families and the community to change attitudes about drinking."

Winter Parking Reminder

November 1st marked the beginning of the Winter Parking season in North Fond du Lac. The Winter Parking season is defined as November 1 through March 31 of the following year. The Police Department would like to remind residents about the Winter Parking regulations. Please cooperate with public works crews by following the restrictions that have been established so that they can be most effective in keeping our roads safe.

The ordinance specifies that between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the snow removal season, it shall be illegal to park any vehicle on any street, highway, or any terrace, street, or highway right of way, during or after any snowfall where the accumulation of snow is one inch or more and the parking of a vehicle on the street, alley, highway, terrace, or right of way interferes with the timely and efficient removal of snow.

Parking penalties for the first violation of the winter parking ordinance during any snow removal season will be \$15.00 (\$30 if not paid within 5 days). The penalty for the second violation shall be \$30.00 (\$45 if not paid within 5 days). The third violation shall be \$50.00 (\$65 if not paid within 5 days), and the fine for any fourth or subsequent violation of the winter parking ordinance during a snow removal season shall be \$100.00.

During any time of snow emergency, which is determined by the Director of Public Works, all vehicles will be required to be moved off the streets by 2 a.m. Failure to adhere to this section will result in citation and towing of vehicles, which are in violation, at owner's expense.

Internet Safety Tips

It is very important for parents to sit down with their children and discuss guidelines for internet use. While the internet is arguably one of the greatest information sources ever known, it is also a portal for predators and identity thieves to enter your home. These few helpful hints will assist you in talking to your child about internet safety:

Always have the computer in a common area.

Never give your name, address, phone number or school name to anyone online without parental permission.

Never agree to meet someone you "met" online. Predators often locate victims via the computer.

Never send a picture or video of yourself to anyone online without checking with your parents first.

Never respond to mean or rude messages that make you feel sad or scared. Tell your parents right away so they can help resolve the issue.

Last, check with your parents before downloading or installing games or programs onto your computer. You may unintentionally open your computer up to unwanted virus' or hackers.

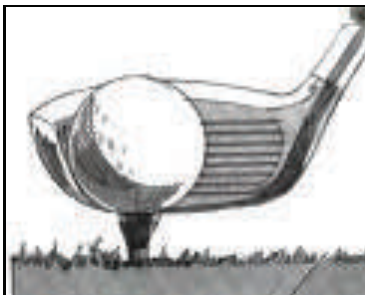
